



THE PRIME AREAS OF LEARNING

COMMUNICATION AND LANGUAGE, PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT, PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Opportunities to develop the prime areas of learning run throughout the curriculum via an enabling environment in adult led, child initiated and outside learning as well as through all other times of the day such as social time, following routines and carpet time etc. They will be taught with individual focus on a cohort/individual needs basis. DIRECT LEARNING WILL TAKE PLACE VIA:

- ✓ No Outsiders focus on being confident in who we are, and that we do not always need to "fit in" using the text "The Family Book" by Todd Parr to build on our understanding that all families are different
- ✓ St Georges Day looking at English traditions and comparing to other countries, cultures, and religious traditions
- ✓ RSE day growing and changing how our bodies change as we get older, and looking back from being a baby to now and how much we have changed!

LITERACY	WORD READING CO	 ✓ To continue to speedy read words containing simple digraphs (especially those that repeat in the text) ✓ To begin to read whole sentences back after sounding out ✓ To recognize commonly used tricky words (red words) with increasing ease
	WRITING	 ✓ Continue to apply known digraphs and digraphs to attempt more complex words ✓ To consistently use finger spaces in sentence writing to break up words ✓ To begin to use full stops at the end of a sentence ✓ To write with increased independence ✓ To learn how to write letters and stories

	NUMBER	 ✓ To recall number bonds to ten without the use of manipulatives ✓ To understand the process of subtraction ✓ To understand what happens when we double a number
MATHEMATICS	NUMERICAL PATTERN	 ✓ To build numbers beyond ten ✓ To spot and record the missing numbers in a number line
	MEASURE, SPACE AND SPATIAL THINKING	✓ To experiment with shapes in the classroom environment — and how when their orientation changes- they remain the same shape.

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PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT	 ✓ To develop balance, agility and coordination when negotiating space ✓ To develop manipulation skills of different objects including hitting and dribbling ✓ To master fundamental motor skills by adjusting speed or direction to avoid obstacles ✓ To engage in co-operative play activities to control objects in space ✓ To tap out simple repeated rhythms using different body parts ✓ To imitate movement in response to music ✓ To develop their movement patterns to create a short motif ✓ Begin to learn some of the principles of dance and perform them in their motif 	To understand traditions linking to St George and compare these with other cultural celebrations we have learnt about. ✓ To look at past and present – medieval times to now ✓ To compare the features of the countryside to the features of a city ✓ To discuss different occupations and the notion of "real life heroes" ✓ Learn about "Coronation" as King Charles is crowned
